Leading Lights Speakers

Analise Adams is a senior at Virginia Tech. Throughout her academic career she has been an integral part of the SERVE living-learning

community, volunteering with this organization to lead her peers in service projects both locally and abroad. Analise mentored students, led service projects and initiated life-changing conversations within the context of SERVE. Her most significant accomplishment continues to be a work in progress as the many students she has inspired to serve follow their own passions and seek social change within their communities.

Separate from her work with SERVE, Analise has dedicated countless ours with the RAFT Crisis Hotline through New River Valley Community Services and the Younglife program in Floyd. Each hour she serves is multiplied as she is always introducing new faces to the idea of living a life of community and commitment. In May Analise will graduate and head to New Orleans for a prestigious Southern Education Foundation internship working in the juvenile justice system before beginning graduate school at UNC Chapel Hill in the fall.

Dr. Sam Minner is Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs at Radford University. Prior to his appointment at RU, Sam was the founding dean of the College of Health Sciences and Education at Truman State University in Kirksville, Missouri. He was the first holder of the James H. Quillen Chair of Excellence in Teaching and Learning at East Tennessee State University and also held faculty and administrative appointments at Northern Arizona University, Murray State University (Murray, Kentucky) and the University of Arizona. He holds undergraduate and graduate degrees from Southern Illinois University and a Ph.D. from the University of Arizona where he graduated with high distinctions. In addition to his experience in American universities, Sam has worked abroad, most notably in Belize, Central America where he worked with the government to establish the first institution of higher education; the University College of Belize. Dr. Minner has also worked in Turkey, Indonesia, Chile, the U.K., China, Mexico, and Australia. His research is in several areas including international development, professional development schools, gifted education, and the study of short-term memory. An active grant-writer and principal investigator, Dr. Minner has won millions of dollars from private foundations and federal government agencies. In addition to his appointment as an endowed professor at East Tennessee State, Dr. Minner won research awards from the American Educational Research Association and teaching awards from several universities and professional organizations. He is married to his wife, Joan, and together they have two children, Brook and Sam.

Dr. Donald E. Stowers, a native of Virginia, has spent his entire professional career in service to Virginia citizens through his work in the field of education. Dr. Stowers began a teaching career at Christiansburg High School in 1970 but was drafted into the United States Army soon afterwards. After 18 months of military service, he returned to teach in Montgomery County and then at Bland Correctional Center. He later served as principal of St. Brides Correctional Center in Chesapeake, Virginia. From 1985 to 2001, Dr. Stowers held various leadership positions with Virginia Beach Public Schools, including assistant principal, principal, and assistant superintendent for High Schools. In 2001, Dr. Stowers returned to the New River Valley to serve as Superintendent of Pulaski County Public Schools, the position from which he retired in 2009.

A "go-to" person and avid proponent and driver for student success, Dr. Stowers has worked at New River Community College since 2010 as director of Volunteer Services. In this role, he leads and manages a student success program entitled "Partners for Success," which includes Academic Assistance, Retention Services, and Volunteer Services. He has also been instrumental in the creation and implementation of the Advanced Learners Program, a special program for intellectually gifted and highly motivated community college students.

Dr. Stowers holds a Bachelor's in English from Virginia Teach, a Master's in English from Radford College, and his Ph.D. in Curriculum and Instruction from Virginia Tech. He and his wife, Deena, reside in Pulaski where both are active in the life of First United Methodist Church. Additionally, Dr. Stowers serves as Vice Chair of the Board of Trustees of Lewis Gale Hospital, Pulaski; and he is a member of the Pulaski Rotary Club.

Jim and Lenna Moore Community Service and Citizenship Award

Lenna Moore was an active volunteer in the NRV and when she passed away suddenly in 1999, the four organizations that Lenna was most active in as a volunteer decided to dedicate this award in her honor. The YMCA at VT, American Red Cross, AARP, and Voluntary Action Center (VAC) began discussing the award criteria and a time to hold the first volunteer recognition event. The first recipient, Bob Stuart, was chosen in 2000 to receive the award, with nominations coming from the four organizations involved. In 2001, the event was expanded to the entire New River Valley.

The recipient that year was Nelda Pearson, who was chosen among nominees submitted by non-profit organizations that utilize volunteers.

Sadly Jim Moore, the late Lenna Moore's husband, passed away shortly before the 2001 event. Jim Moore was also a very dedicated volunteer in the community. The planning committee voted to name the award in honor of both of them.

She often takes charge of the donations for students with food allergies, reading labels and substituting other foods when necessary. Joe Ivers' community service includes Presbyterian's at Your Service (PRAYS), Micah's Backpack, and the Montgomery County Educational Foundation, among others.
