Frank's writing and research interests focus on student learning and engagement, positive psychology and its influence on student growth and development, strengthening intellectual life in campus residential environments, honors programs,



and reorganizing colleges and universities to ensure all students belong to a caring community of learning. A frequent contributor to higher education literature, Frank's recent articles can be found in About Campus, the Journal of College and Character, and the Journal of Leadership Studies, among others.

Frank holds a bachelor's degree from Baylor University; a master of arts in higher education and student affairs administration from The Ohio State University, and a Doctor of Philosophy in higher education policy from the University of Maryland, College Park. Frank and his wife Kelly, a United Methodist minister, have three children.

Kim Schwenk is a recipient of a 2013 Leading Lights Award. She was honored in recognition of her selfless actions to help others succeed, and for her work as the director of the Giving Tree Food Pantry.

Located in Christiansburg, the Giving Tree is an all-volunteer food pantry dedicated to serving the hungry in the New River Valley. The Giving Tree operates under the belief that "we are open to all without exception who come seeking food."

Kim recruits, trains, and schedules volunteers to work the pantry and recruits groups to sponsor food





drives. She is well known for her abilities to shop for the best deals for food for the pantry. Embodying the principle of love for others, Kim demonstrates this principle through her actions. She accepts people from all walks of life and makes a point of talking to and knowing the food pantry clients. No one is a stranger to Kim. A humble person, Kim finds the greatest joy in serving others.

She volunteers her time around the holidays to the Montgomery County Christmas Store and Operation Santa Claus. She is known as a skilled motivator, knows the right approaches to help students learn, can effectively encourage positive behavior, and can easily be distinguished for the lasting, positive impact she has on the children with whom she works.

Deena Flinchum

For Deena Flinchum, helping her community have a healthier quality of life is of utmost importance. For at least seven years, she has worked with the NRV Agency on Aging assisting older adults with Medicare enrollment, helping over 900 people save a total of \$389,956 in prescription coverage, and providing pet food for pets owned by low-income older adults with the Montgomery County Humane Society. She writes a regular newspaper column with healthy advice for older adults and their caregivers and speaks to groups on preventing Medicare fraud. She has made a huge impact on the health of people living in the NRV, making it a better place to grow up and grow older.

Don Fraser

Don has served as the volunteer director of Bike the US for MS since he founded the non-profit in 2007. The organization, which Don started from scratch, now raises over \$250,000 per year, which helps fund MS clinics and research facilities, is a means to provide home modifications and mobility equipment, and as a way to coordinate volunteer efforts in the homes of patients with MS. It is estimated that he volunteers over 20 hours per week to this organization, and his colleagues describe him as "dedicated,"



working tirelessly and displaying a great amount of skill and ability to building an organization." Aside from his efforts with Bike the US for MS, Don also serves on the board of the Blue Ridge Chapter of the National MS Society.

She is actively involved with providing remedial support for fifth graders in math, science, and writing at Floyd Elementary School and curates and leads tours at the Floyd County Historical Society Museum. Janet is a charter member of the Slusher Family Organization since 1970, where her patience and pursuit of excellence have become her hallmarks.

Marian Kelso

Marian's volunteer experience exemplifies her wide-array of talents. Aside from volunteering her time as a receptionist, tour guide, and information guide at Warm Hearth Village where she resides she also contributed over 300 hours of community service to Lewis-Gale hospital in the past year, where she was named Volunteer of the Year for her efforts and dedication. She can often be found reading to students at Margaret Beeks Elementary School and can be found volunteering her time as Mrs. Clause around the holidays.
